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

We underpin these values with an emphasis on Tikanga Māori. Whangaroa College is a Year 7–13 state coeducational school set in idyllic and peaceful surroundings on SH10 in Kāeo.

We sit in a valley bounded by the Kāeo River, Pohue Pa, Maungaemiemi, Whakarara and Taratara maunga. Ngāti Kahu and Ngāpuhi are tangata whenua. The beautiful and tranquil Whangaroa Harbour is less than 10 kms away. The East Coast offers views of the Cavalli Islands and access to the surfing and swimming beaches of Matauri Bay, Te Ngaere Bay, Wainui Bay and Tauranga Bay.

The campus contains beautifully positioned and well-tended native and exotic trees and shrubs. There is also a range of outdoor sport and recreation facilities in the College grounds.

The College is well equipped to cater for academic, sporting and cultural needs. Whangaroa College is an NZQA accredited provider of both conventional and non-conventional school subjects.

# **ENROLMENTS**

Enrolment packs can be collected from the school office 9:00am to 3:30pm Monday to Friday. Enrolment forms can also be found on our school website-https://www.whc.school.nz/

If you wish to pick up an enrolment pack before the end of the school year 2025, then please be aware that the school will be closed from Thursday 11th December.

There is an enrolment process to follow before a new student begins school.

#### **ENROLMENT PROCESS**



Every new student will meet the Principal at the start of the year as well as the Director of Wellbeing or the Director of Teaching and Learning. This meeting is for the student and parent/caregiver and will take approximately 30 minutes.

**Juniors (Years 7-10)** will meet with the Director of Wellbeing to look at learning and wellbeing needs.

**Seniors (Years 11-13)** will meet with the Director of Teaching and Learning to discuss senior academic courses and pathways and to select course options.



# DAILY ORGANISATION

## **TIMETABLE**

We have five periods per day, which are an hour long. Whānau time in the morning is a chance to touch base with whānau teachers and the roll is taken.

Students get a free lunch at school, which is home cooked and fresh daily. They are also welcome to attend breakfast club daily.

There are games and training sessions at break times and lunch times. The library is open four lunch times per week and in the summer the pool is often open.

School buses arrive shortly after 3:10 for the students to get home.

#### PB4L

Positive Behaviour for Learning (PB4L) is a programme used throughout schools, focusing on positive behaviour and encouraging a more settled environment. Within PB4L we use Restorative Practice, which supports schools to build positive, respectful relationships across the whole school community. What this means is that we do not use the traditional discipline model, but a more student-centered approach when tackling issues around behaviour.



We have 4 houses- Kauri, Matai, Tawa and Miro

# **WHĀNAU HOUSES**

Whānau houses are made up of Years 7-13. The four houses compete throughout the year with sports days, weekly challenges, attendance & uniform points, PB4L "Student of the Week" awards and more. It encourages leadership and supportive environments.

In whānau time we have PB4L lessons around our school values and behaviour. These are taught skills and are very important to the well-being of our students.

We attempt to put siblings in the same houses. This way whānau have one main point of call when discussing their child's learning.







# **CURRICULUM**

All students from Years 7-13 are required to take English and Mathematics, with literacy and numeracy skills embedded across all learning areas, especially our Integrated Studies Learning system (Pods).

We have five one hour long periods per day, with two break times. We have found that a deeper understanding can be gained with longer periods. All periods have a clear structure, which breaks up the hour and provides a few different activities and learning tasks (for those students who enjoy a variety of learning opportunities within each subject).

**Integrated Studies for senior learning** As a small school it is difficult to offer all subject areas to our students for all of their pathways. Our Integrated Studies have multiple subject areas and focus on a thematic approach so students have access to all the areas they need. We individualise student learning, so consideration is given to areas of interest aimed at ability levels.

We also have an emphasis on Te Reo Māori and where possible, Science. All junior levels are also provided for in these curriculum areas where possible.

Gateway, Trades and STAR programme placements for seniors are provided to offer additional skills and knowledge in work settings outside the classroom.






## **GRADUATE PROFILE**

Our Graduate Profile outlines what a graduate of Whangaroa College looks like and serves as a framework for tracking student growth. It is designed to help students, staff, and families monitor progress toward a set of graduation criteria across four main areas: Skills, Knowledge, Attitudes, and Values. Each area is broken down into specific competencies, such as Literacy, Time Management, Global Citizenship, Strong Work Ethic, and Resilience. For each competency, there is a four-stage progression: Beginning, Developing, Achieved, and Excellence. This tiered system provides clear benchmarks to show a student's current level and what they need to do to improve. The profile covers a wide range of abilities, from traditional academic skills like Numeracy and Researching to practical life skills such as Banking, Housekeeping, and Finding a Job. It also emphasises social-emotional qualities like Active Listening, Compassion, Empathy, and Integrity. The inclusion of concepts like Te Reo Māori, Marae participation, and Cultural Identity suggests a focus on the cultural context of the school community. The profile is a tool to help students and those who support them see where they stand and what steps they need to take to meet the graduation standards and develop into well-rounded individuals.

# **INTEGRATED STUDIES**

We have four learning Integrated Studies Pods. Students can access multiple subject areas and have the opportunity to learn from a more topic based, thematic approach.

- Year 7 to 10 students take more traditional subjects that feed into Integrated Studies. See below which subject areas fit under the different Integrated Studies Pods. The purpose here is to build the skills required to undertake a course of learning at the senior level.
- Year 11 to 13 students can choose one integrated study per semester. We have two semesters per year. Semester 1 (Terms 1 & 2) and Semester 2 (Terms 3 & 4).

# SENIOR SCHOOL

Here at Whangaroa College there is an emphasis on individual learning and setting a programme that works for every individual student.

**Core subjects**: English and Mathematics (at various levels) are compulsory for all senior students. English areas include; *Academic English* and *CAA English*. Mathematics areas include; *Academic Mathematics and CAA Mathematics*.

**Modules (Mods):** students choose two Mods per semester. Modules are specific subjects offered to reinforce learning in the Pods and to ensure the coverage of subjects for our senior students. These vary depending on student interest and need. These are set at the required levels for our students. These subjects run in the first three periods of the day. Each subject has five periods a week.

**Pods**: Senior students select one Pod per semester. They can change each semester or choose to stay in the Pod as the courses change each semester. Pods have seven, one hour periods a week. Pods are designed with the students in mind, so not one course of learning is exactly the same as another.

## **GATEWAY STAR & TRADES ACADEMY**

**Gateway/STAR:** These courses are mostly offered to Year 11, 12 and 13 students who have indicated an interest in a particular workplace or career pathway. All Gateway courses are run during term time.

We have had students complete Gateway courses in:

- Retail services
- PADI Diving
- Sports and Recreation
- Computing and Digital Technology
- Hairdressing and Beauty
- Agriculture and Horticulture
- Electrical Engineering
- Early childhood Education

Individualised Gateway programmes can be designed for students, If you are interested in a Gateway course, please make sure you indicate this during your Academic Counselling meeting.

**Trades Academies:** Trades Academies also target Year 12 and 13 students, but some Year 11 students can be accepted into them if they show a keen interest and have the appropriate literacy and numeracy requirements. Students who enrol into a Trades Academy must stay on this course for the full year.

# **JUNIOR SCHOOL**

**Years 7-10 and Core Subjects:** We aim to have one class of each year group in Years 7-10. They will have five periods each of English, Mathematics and Te Reo Māori per week. All other learning will be integrated over the year.


